•	If Judges 2 gave us a birds eye view of the Caananization of Israel,
	Judges 6 provides us with a close up view of the same process. Gideon
	and his brothers in Manasseh had

o ... forgotten the LORD who had saved them (vv. 1-10),

o ... forsaken the LORD who loves them (vv. 11-27),

o ... and had <u>fled</u> for protection to another god (vv. 28-34).

But God condescended to be <u>fleeced</u> by Gideon (vv 36-40).

Community Group Study Questions

For the Week of Feb 12-18

Context

The narrative about Gideon follows the narrative of Deborah and Barak (Judges 4:1-5:31).

- 1. Compare the situation in Judges 6 with that in Judges 4.
 - a. How was the situation similar and how was it different? Who were the oppressors in Judges 4? (Judges 4:2) In Judges 6? (Judges 6:1-3).
 - b. An unlikely heroine in Judges 4-5 is Jael, the wife of Heber the Kenite. How are the Kenites related to the Israelites? (See Judges 4:11 and Num 10:29).
- 2. Gideon is a reluctant leader (Judges 6:15). Do the previous judges exhibit reluctance to lead? (Judges 4:8) Do you recall another reluctant Israelite leader? (Ex 4:10) Do you think a connection is being made here? Why or why not?
- 3. Should the Israelites have expected oppression when they strayed from the worship of Yahweh? (See Deut 31:14-18, Joshua 24:14-20, Judges 2:1-3)
- 4. Compare the rebuke given in Judges 6:7-10 with the rebuke given in Judges 2:1-4. Is there a similar figure in Judges 4?

Observation

- 1. Read Judges 6:2-5. What is added to this narrative when verses 1 and 6 are included?
- 2. Compare this narrative with Judges 2:11-18)? Does the narrative follow the established pattern?
- 3. Compare the narrative of the raising up of Gideon (Judges 6:11-24) with the raising up of Othniel (Jugdes 2:7-9), Ehud (Judges 2:12-15) and Barak (Judges 4:1-9). How is it similar? How is it different?

Meaning

- 1. Is there a problem with Gideon's response to the angel of the Lord in Judges 6:13? Who is to blame for the troubles Gideon is experiencing?
- 2. What do Gideon's repeated demands for a sign say about his faith? (Judges 6:17, 36-40, see Deut 6:16; Mark 8:11)
- 3. What is the significance the the cult site to Baal in Ophrah? (Judges 6:25-32, see Ex 20:1-3; Deut 6:4). What is the significance of tearing down the altar and offering a sacrifice to Yahweh burned on the wood of the former Asherah pole? (Judges 6:27, see 1 Kings 18).

4. What does the incident with the fleece tell us about the faithfulness of God? (Judges 6:36-40). What does it tell us about the faithfulness of Gideon?

Application

- 1. The time of the Judges was a time of national apostasy in Israel. Is this in any way similar to the situation that we are facing today?
 - a. The Israelites responded with cries for help, but not with repentance. Do we respond similarly?
 - b. Consider suffering you have faced in the past few years. Do you sometimes feel that God is no longer there?
 - c. Do we turn to God for rescue in time of trouble, or do we look for solutions that are no different from those pursued by our unbelieving neighbors?
- 2. How does our Savior compare with the reluctant Gideon?
- 3. Do we sometimes put our Lord to the test, seeking confirmation of the concern he has already shown for us?
