"YHWH Moshi'ek Go'alek: The LORD your Savior and your Redeemer" Sermon Notes

- > Yahweh, our Savior and Redeemer, the Mighty One of Jacob, is a God with a profound sense of irony.
 - 1. He harnesses the unjust as instruments of His law (Isa 49:26).

2. But he also harnesses the merciless as instruments of His leniency (Isa 60:10-16).

Community Group Study Questions

For the Week of July 24th - 30th

Context

This week we are focusing on God as he was revealed to Isaiah as Savior and Redeemer.

- 1. Isaiah served as a prophet during the reigns of five kings, including Ahaz and his son, Hezekiah.
 - a. Who did these kings turn to for rescue? (See 2 Chr 28: 15-20; 32:1-8). What was the outcome?
- 2. Prior to appealing to Assyria for help, Ahaz was advised to trust in the Lord for aid (Isa 7:1-12).
 - a. How did Ahaz respond? (Isa 7:10-13). Was his response correct? (See Luke 4:12). What is wrong with his response?
 - b. What sign is given? (See Isa 7:14-16; 8:3-4, 18) What is the significance of the name, Immanuel? (See Deut 31:6; Josh 1:9; Matt 1:13). What is the relationship between the prophet's son, Maher-shalal-hash-baz (the name means "the spoil speeds, the prey hastes") and Immanuel (Isa 9:6-7)?
- 3. During his reign, due to the disastrous policies of his father, Ahaz, King Hezekiah was under tribute to Assyria (2 Kings 18:14-16). How was Hezekiah saved from the Assyrians? (See Isa 37:14-38.

Observation

- 1. In Isa 49:26 and Isa 60:16, the Lord refers to himself as YHWH, your Savior and your Redeemer, the Mighty One of Jacob.
 - a. We discussed God's might when we discussed Gen 17:1-2; 28:3; 35:11; 43:14; and 48:3 in our study of God as El Shaddai: God Almighty.
 - b. A savior is a deliverer, or rescuer. Are other saviors mentioned in the Bible? (See Jdg 3:9; 15; 2 Kg 1:15)
 - 1. What are some examples of times when God saved Israel? (Ps 106:21)
 - 2. Who is the ultimate savior (Mt 1:21; Lk 2:11; Jn 4:42; Acts 13:23, 6:31, 13:23; Tit 3:4)? From what danger does he save us? (2 Tim 1:10)
 - c. A redeemer is someone who who buys back a slave by payment of ransom. (Ex 21:7-8; Num 18:15-16; Lev 25:4-7)
 - 1. Redemption could also be made for someone whose life was legally forfeit (Ex 21:28-32).
 - 1. How was Israel redeemed by God? (Ex 6:6; Deut 15:15; Isa 52:3; 45:13)
 - 2. What ransom was paid by the ultimate redeemer? (Matt 20:28; Mark 10;45; Acts 20:28)
 - 3. From what have we been redeemed? (Tit 2:13-14)
 - 4. What is the relationship of the redeemed to their redeemer? (1 Cor 7:22-24)

- 2. The prophecy about salvation in Chapter 49 is preceded by a prophecy about the Servant of the Lord (Isa 49:1-7). What is the connection to the prophecy about salvation in Chapter 49?
- 3. The prophecy about salvation in Chapter 49 is followed by another oracle about the Servant of God in Chapter 50. What is the connection?
- 4. The prophecy about the future Glory of Israel in chapter 60 is preceded by a prophecy of judgment. What is the connection?
- 5. The prophecy about the future glory of Israel in chapter 60 is followed by a prophecy about the year of the Lord's favor in Chapter 61. What is the connection? When is the year of the Lord's favor?

Meaning

- 1. In Chapter 49 of Isaiah, the LORD promises a restoration for Israel.
 - 1. What evidence will God provide to show that he has not forsaken Israel? (49:18-21)
 - 2. Has this evidence come to pass, or is it yet in the future?
- 2. In Chapter 60 of Isaiah God describes a time when the nation will build, rather than tear down the city of God (Isa 60:10-14). Has this transformation of the nations yet taken place?
 - 1. There is a warning for nations who fail to participate (v 12). Has that warning been fulfilled?

Application

- 1. In light of what we have learned, how should we respond to the challenges we face today in terms of financial crises, legal crises, and war?
- 2. Do these passages challenge your beliefs? Do you rely upon your finances, your country, or our alliances for your safety and security?
- 3. What evidence is there in your life that you are trusting in God's promise of salvation and redemption?
